TRUSTEES' REPORT**

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

The Trustees present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2017.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES AND OBJECTIVES

The Society's principal objectives are to stimulate public interest, to promote high standards of planning and architecture and to secure the preservation, protection, development and improvement of features of historic or public interest in the area of benefit, which is defined as an area comprising the watershed of the Conwy River, south of Afon Ganol.

The Society is controlled by the Trustees and, in the main, achieves its objectives through activities such as meetings, lectures and exhibitions in the area of benefit.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

RESULTS

The results are set out in the attached statement of financial activities. The Trustees consider the state of affairs to be satisfactory and that sufficient revenue will be received to meet the Society's expenditure in the future. The following is relevant:-

Membership

The number of subscribers decreased from 75 to 64, (2015: 71; 2014: 86; 2013: 87; 2012: 88; 2011: 92; 2010: 93; 2009: 105; 2008: 112), including 13 business subscribers (2016:14; 2015: 14; 2014: 16; 2013: 18; 2012: 18; 2011: 20; 2010: 20; 2009: 23). On the basis that family and business subscriptions cover 2 members, this represents around 112 members (last year 126 – 2015: 125; 2014: 148; 2013: 153; 2012: 153; 2011: 160; 2010: 157; 2009: 177; 2008: 190; 2007: 192).

General Fund - Receipts

Subscription income has decreased by £102 to £670 (including business members' contributions).

The tax rebate was £126 less than last year. This arises under the "Gift Aid" scheme, which 43 tax paying members have joined, (2016: 42).

Interest received amounted to £14, - £15 last year. The reduction in the interest received by the Society over the past number of years has been wholly attributable to the fall in interest rates.

General Fund - Expenditure

AGM and general expenses decreased by £24 and our speaker/room hire costs decreased by £28 to £246. The cost of producing and distributing our newsletters increased by £7 to £124. The website/computer costs decreased by £32, to £49. Our contribution to the Heritage Fund, agreed at last year's AGM, was £500.

With regard to the Award Scheme Fund, your Committee has decided that there will be a transfer of £nil to the Award Scheme Fund for the year ended 31 March 2017.

The Award Scheme Fund now stands at £1,668, in advance of the next Awards Ceremony on 1 June 2017.

The Heritage Fund

The Heritage Fund was established to provide a reserve of funds to be used for specific heritage projects in the area of benefit and therefore can be regarded as a restricted fund for the purposes of the Charities Act and these accounts. As this fund has its own constitution and administrators (although 3 closely associated with the Society), details of its financial position are given in a separate statement. This shows a decrease in the fund from £4,280 to £3,009 following two payments from the fund during the year.

The annual transfer to the Heritage Fund, which last year was £500, is to be approved by the members at the AGM.

TRUSTEES

The Trustees who served during the period are as set out on page 3.

DEVELOPMENTS

The Society has, as mentioned above, recorded an excess of income over expenditure in the year.

FUTURE STRATEGY

The strategy continues to be to further the Society's objectives, as set out on page 4, and to operate the Society on a financially sound basis whilst endeavouring to extend the membership in the area of benefit.

RESERVES POLICY

The Trustees have established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds held by the Society should be greater than or equal to the resources expended in the year, after the transfer to the Heritage Fund. As at 31 March 2017, the general fund amounted to £2,717 compared to expenditure of £1,090 in the year. As mentioned above, the Trustees have recommended a transfer to the Award Scheme Fund of £nil.

INVESTMENT POLICY


The Trustees have considered the most appropriate policy for investing funds, which is, at present, to hold surplus funds on deposit at the COIF (Charities Official Investment Fund) Charities Deposit Fund.

RISK REVIEW

The Trustees have conducted their own review of the major risks to which the Society is exposed and systems have been established to mitigate those risks. The Trustees do not consider there to be significant external risks to funding. Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and to ensure consistent quality of delivery for all operational aspects of the society. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they still meet the needs of the Society. The Trustees meet not less than 4 times a year at intervals of about 2 months.

The report of the Trustees has been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Independent Examiners Report to the Members of Conwy Valley Civic Society

This report on the Accounts of the Society for the year ended 31 March 2017 which are set out on pages 8 to 11 (and include the Conwy Valley Heritage Fund), is in respect of an examination carried out under section 43 of the Charities Act 1993

Respective responsibilities of the Society and Examiner:

As members of the Society you are responsible for the preparation of the Accounts. You consider that the audit requirement of Section 43(2) of the Charities Act 1993 (the Act) does not apply and that an independent examination is needed. Basis of Independent Examiner's Report:

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you as members of the Society concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and, consequently, I do not express an audit opinion on the accounts.



**NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017**

Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and include the results of the Society's activities. These statements have been drawn up in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice issued by the Charity Commissioners.

Income

The principal sources of income are disclosed in the Income and Expenditure Account. Subscriptions and other receipts are the amounts receivable during the year. Bank interest is the amount received in the year.

Expenditure

The expenditure is shown under the respective headings and covers the costs involved in the running and the administration of the Society.

Payments to the trustees

The trustees did not receive any remuneration during the year.

During the year the trustees were reimbursed expenses incurred in the running and administration of the Society amounting to £157.15 (2016: £1,361.76).
